This serving took a minimum of time at the lunch period; but it tires one to think of the hours of labor preceding enjoyment of the meal.

For years whenever the Clayton W. M. S. was mentioned I had a clear mental picture of Mrs. B. A. Hocutt and the late Mrs. D. J. Thurston, surrounded by numerous unknown, and therefore featureless women; but I am filled with admiration and appreciation for what has been done by those I do not know.

The president of our woman's club, Mrs. Fred Page, has suggested that I do a little publicity work for the clean-up campaign soon to be put on here. The truth is that before I say one word to anyone else about any condition that may require remedying I shall be compelled to tackle my own back yard, and also the front. If you fail to be urged by me to be active in the clean-up work, it will be because I simply haven't the nerve to insist that you do what I have not yet succeeded in accomplishing.

But I must for various reasons attend few games. One is that I am too old for such strenuous exertion as football, and Saturday's contest exhausted me. For with all my heart, and to the best of my knowledge and belief, I played with the Wake Forest team that day.
