

## **Thousands Attend Rites** For Seven Children Killed in Bus Accident



Both drivers were absolved of responsibility for the accident by a Nash County coroner's jury last Friday morning. Homer Bunn of Middlesex served as chairman of the jury, which blamed highway and school authorities for the crash. There is a sharp curve at the bridge, and vision is obscured by dense vegetation along the right-of-way.

Four children were killed outright, including Ronnie Carter, who operated the bus "stop" sign, who was thrown out of the school bus by the impact. Others died
