Guard Unit Makes Room for 20 Men **After Cut in Funds**

Plans were made Tuesday night to enlist another twenty in Battery A, 113 Field Artillery Battalion, according to First Sgt. Sidney Holmes. The original maximum number set for the unit was 50 men, Holmes said, and this number was exceeded nearly a week ago.

Battery Commander Capt. Barrie Davis stated that he had received a notice which said budget limitations will limit the National Guard to its size at the end of the present recruiting campaign.

"We are hoping for funds, to enlarge our supply room," Davis said, "so that we will be able to take care of the additional men. We do not want to be caught with just 50 men if the size of our unit is frozen."

Sgt. 1c Clif Gilliam will be in the armory from eight in the morning until five in the afternoon Monday through Friday of each week. He has the necessary enlistment papers. Physical examination can be given by Dr. Chas. Flowers, Dr. Ben Thomas, and Dr. Durward Stallings.

The final drill of the year will be held Monday night, Dec. 12. The drill originally scheduled for Dec. 19 was held last night.
