Howard Beck, Larry Page, Cordeil Page, David Alford, Vaughn Wade, Leary Davis and Jay Godwin.

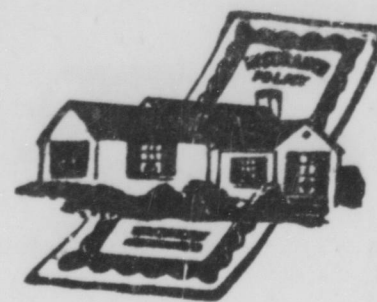
Theatre Manager Attends WF Prevue

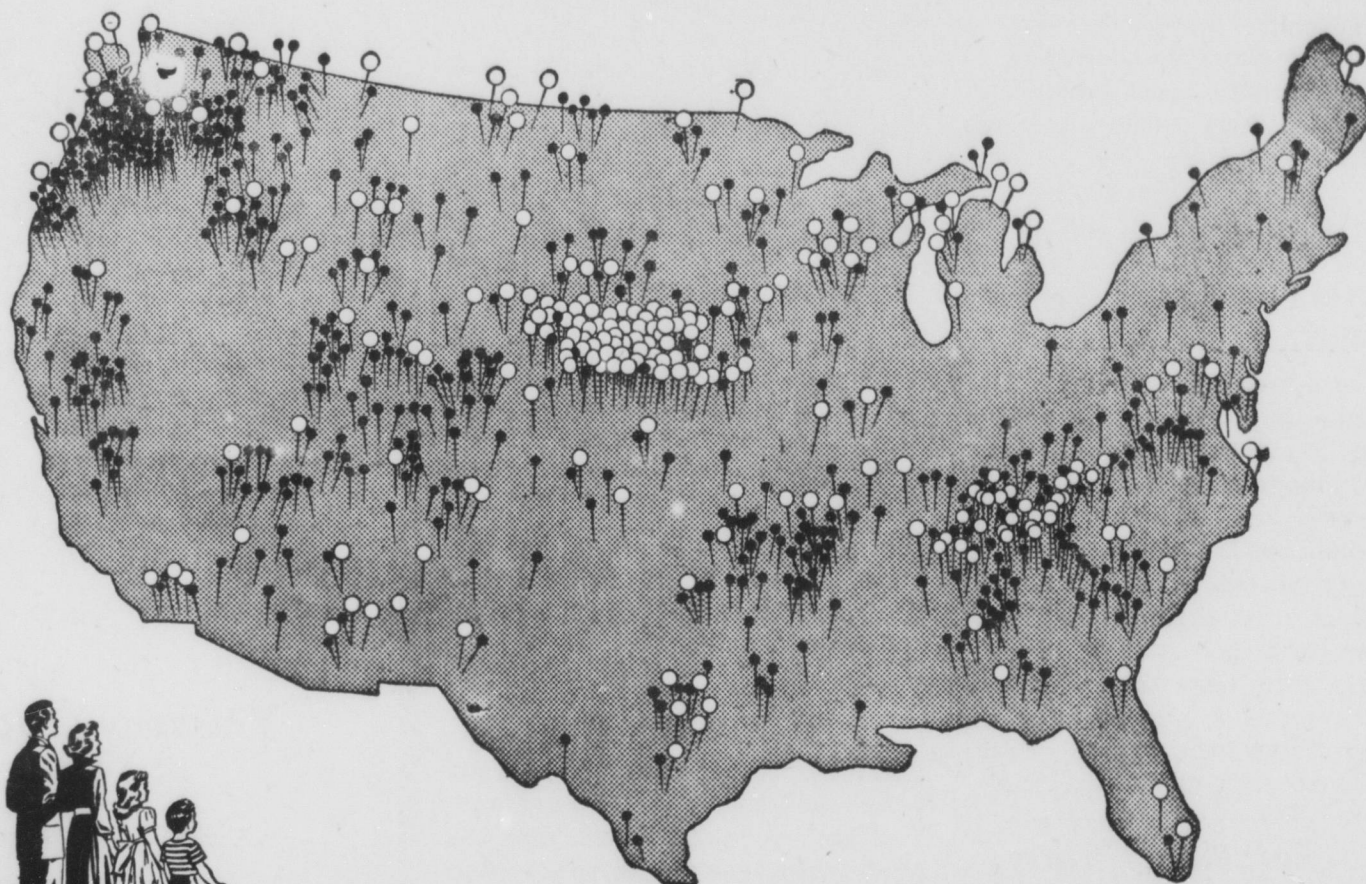
