Variety Tests Proving Dixie 17 Corn Is Best

Official variety tests in the Coastal Plain and Piedmont regions show that Dixie 17 white hybrid corn outyields N. C. 27 yellow but that the latter variety is superior in grain quality, stalk strength, and weevil resistance.

In the tests, which were conducted from 1947 through 1949, Dixie 17 outyielded the best open-pollinated yellow variety by 40 per cent. N. C. 27 outyielded the best open-pollinated yellow variety by 26.1 per cent in the Piedmont and 21.4 per cent in the Coastal Plain.

Both hybrids have become very popular in North Carolina since 1947 and are replacing older, less desirable hybrids such as N. C. 26 and Tenn. 10.

The body lay in state at the church from 1 p. m. until time for the rites. The Rev. William Combs officiated, assisted by the Rev. A. D. Parrish. Burial was in the church cemetery. Funeral services for Howard D. Privette were held Thursday afternoon at 3:30 at the First Baptist Church in Rocky Mount by Dr. J. W. Kincheloe, pastor. Burial was in Pineview Cemetery.

Mr. Privette met his death early Wednesday morning in an automobile accident four miles north of Warsaw. He was a native of Franklin County and had been engaged in business in Rocky Mount for the last twenty-five years. He was the son of the late Willis E. and Elizabeth Privette of Franklin County.

Those surviving are his wife, Mrs. Foye H. Privette; one daughter, Genevieve, a student at Wake Forest College; three brothers, E. P. of Spring Hope, Sam of Greensboro, and Jessie of Zebulon; two sisters, Mrs. J. E. Wright of Zebulon and Mrs. W. H. Perry of Youngsville.
