North Carolina's 1950 turkey crop is expected to be about 20 per cent larger than the 1949 crop.

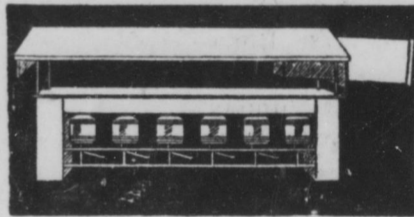
Sales of both purebred Tamworth hogs and purebred Guernsey cows will be held at the Forsyth County Fairgrounds on Monday, April 3.
