

We're Just as Good As New Yorkers; Local Water Short

Zebulon housewives who were alarmed Friday afternoon at the lack of water had their fears dispelled by Willie B. Hopkins, who said that the shortage was caused by three burned-out motors and not by dry wells. By Sunday noon all four of the deep wells which provide the town's water supply were pumping normally and the water tank was full again.


Chief Hopkins stated that a Carolina Power & Light Company power line fell Friday between Zebulon and Wakefield, causing a single phase circuit which burned out the three pump motors located along Arendell Avenue. For some reason, the thermo-switches failed to cut out the power before the

The first motor was repaired and back in operation Saturday morning at 11:00, and the town had a limited water supply available. Filling stations and garages were ordered not to wash any cars until the wells were again in operation Sunday.
