The meeting in May will be held with Mrs. E. A. Rhodes.

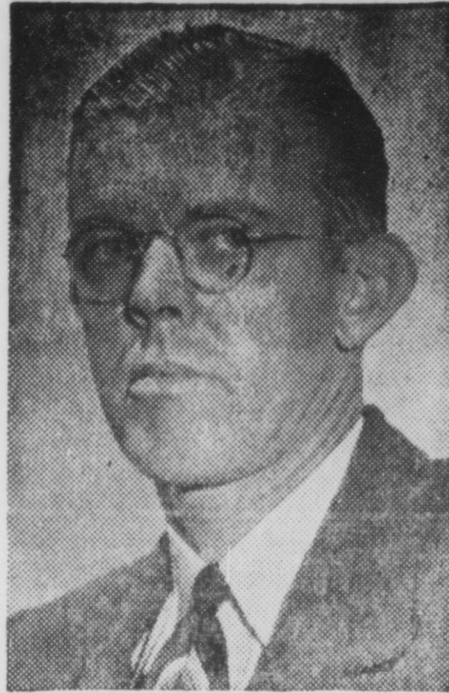
### Baptist Church Plans

## Battery A Plans Summer Work; Gilliam Is Named Warrant Officer

Battery A, Zebulon's National Guard unit, will hold its drill period next week on Monday night at 7:30 (1930 hours, Army time). The sectional training will continue the preparation for the 15-day summer encampment and weekend firing at Camp Butner.

WOjg Clifford Gilliam said that the arrival of the moving picture projector and screen will aid in training. Last week a special film was shown for the drivers. The projector is a new RCA machine.

The battery executive officer, Lt. Philip Pearce, stated that the strength of the battery at summer camp will be a factor in its eligibility for the coveted Eisenhower trophy. He urged employers to plan for their workers who are in

the National Guard to attend the maneuvers at Ft. Jackson, S. C.

Two more vacancies have occurred in the battery, First Sergeant Sidney Holmes announced yesterday. He urged that applicants see the administrative assistant at the armory at once.

The grade of Warrant Officer is authorized under a new revision to the Table of Organization which specifies the ratings available to men in the battery.
