Herbert Appenzeller, coach at Wakelon School, will assist the new director on a parttime basis.

The Wake Forest student is majoring in physical education and recreation, and was highly recommended to the local Recreation Council by Prof. James W. Long. He gained his experience at Lenoir in industrial and community recreation work.

The Community Recreation Council is in the midst of a drive to raise funds to finance the summer program, which will be designed to include every age group.
