Battery A, 113 FA Bn, will leave from the Zebulon National Guard Armory at 9 a. m. tomorrow morning for Camp Butner, where the unit will fire carbines on the rifle range for familiarization and record. The men will return early Sunday afternoon.

The firing Saturday and Sunday climaxes several weeks of instruction on the carbines, supervised by Lt. William Shore, Lt. Philip Pearce, and WOjg Clifford Gilliam.

FINALS ARE HELD AT G. C.

Dr. Arthur Hollis Edens, president of Duke University, delivered the commencement address to 37 graduating seniors at Greensboro College Monday. A large audience witnessed the event.

"Too many colleges substitute buildings, number of students, and endowment for integrity, quality of personality, and moral convictions," he said as he spoke on "Your College and You." "The strength of the small college is the conviction shared by faculty, trustees, and students."

He urged students to demand of themselves the optimum of performance. He termed "deplorable" the practice of giving too much attention to lazy, incompetent students and not enough to the capable ones.

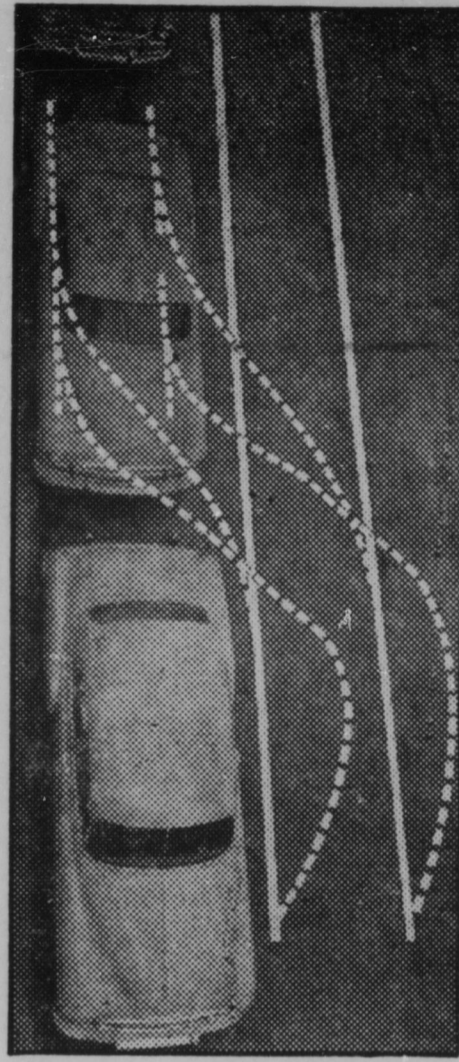

HOW TO PARK



A survey of high school driving instructors by the Chevrolet Motor Division discloses parking as the toughest maneuver for students to master. The above photo-diagram illustrates correct procedure. First, stop close and approximately even with the car ahead. Next, cut your wheels sharply right, and back up until your front right bumper just clears the rear left bumper of the car ahead. Then, cut your wheels sharply left, backing slowly until alongside of curb.
