Tar Heel Farmers Urged to Grow **Sheep for Profit**

North Carolina farmers who are looking for a livestock enterprise may find the answer to their questions in sheep, says Lemuel Goode, animal husbandry scientist with the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station.

Goode says he is convinced that a well managed flock can be one of the most profitable enterprises in the State.

He has plenty of good reasons to support his conviction. One of the more important reasons is that the number of sheep in this country has declined rapidly in recent years. Lamb prices are expected to stay at a high level longer than prices of beef or pork. Also lamb is a speciality product and has less price fluctuation than other meats. Wool, a second product from sheep, lessens the risk of the investment. Wool prices are high and should remain high with government support.
