State 4-H Club Cotton Farmers Warned Danger of Boll Weevils Now Greater than Ever

Boll weevil infestation is heav-ier this year than ever before, ac-Heels have been selected to repre- cording to George D. Jones, exten-sion entomologist at North Carosent North Carolina at the Nation- lina State College. This year for the week ending June 9, out of al 4-H Club Camp to be held in 65 fields examined, all but three were infested and the average

number of weevils per 100 plants was 12, almost 12 times as many as one year ago.

In most areas cotton is unusually small for this time of the season; only in the southernmost counties were any squares found. But even in this small cotton more weevils were found than in any

previous year on record. Because of the large number of weevils now in the fields poisoning is strongly advised, even though squares are not yet formed. Weevil damage to young plants, before squares are formed, has resulted in killing of terminal growth. Young squares have been damaged in many fields. causing "bushy" plants. Heavy weevil infestation will cause severe damage to forming squares. Should Plan Now
