Zebulon folks who want to learn to swim will have an opportunity to participate in a regular Aemrican Red Cross water safety program at a local pool, according to Louis Gray and Bob Emanuel, Wake County ARC water safety workers, who have arranged through Joe Tippett and the Zebulon Record to offer such a course this summer.

Swimming Classes

Mr. Tippett has offered the Red Cross use of his pool in the mornings for beginners' instructions, and in addition offered the use of his lake for instruction of advanced swimmers.

"I am very much interested in this program," he declared, "and will let the children and other non-swimmers use my pool without charge during the Red Cross instruction hours."

Completed This Week

Mr. Gray, Wake County Water Safety Chairman, said that the program should be worked out during this week as far as dates and hours are concerned.

"We are happy to have this site, so convenient to the people of Zebulon and the surrounding community, made available to us," he declared. "This will mean that other pools where Red Cross training is given, may now learn to swim."
