Rocky Mount Center

Twenty-five persons were examined in the Rocky Mount Cancer Detection Diagnostic Clinics last week, when the clinics were held, for the 26th time at the local Board of Health.

The 25 persons examined consisted of two white, 19 white women, and four Negro women. Only four of the examinees had been referred to the clinic by a physician. Persons examined represented Rocky Mount and outlying areas, Spring Hope, Louisburg, Tarboro, Halifax, Bailey, Nashville, Bethel, Parmele, Zebulon, Weldon and Macclesfield.

In order that those who live at a distance may be sure of an examination when they come to the wlinic and thus not make a trip in vain, priorities will be issued on request to anyone living twenty miles or more from Rocky Mount.
