

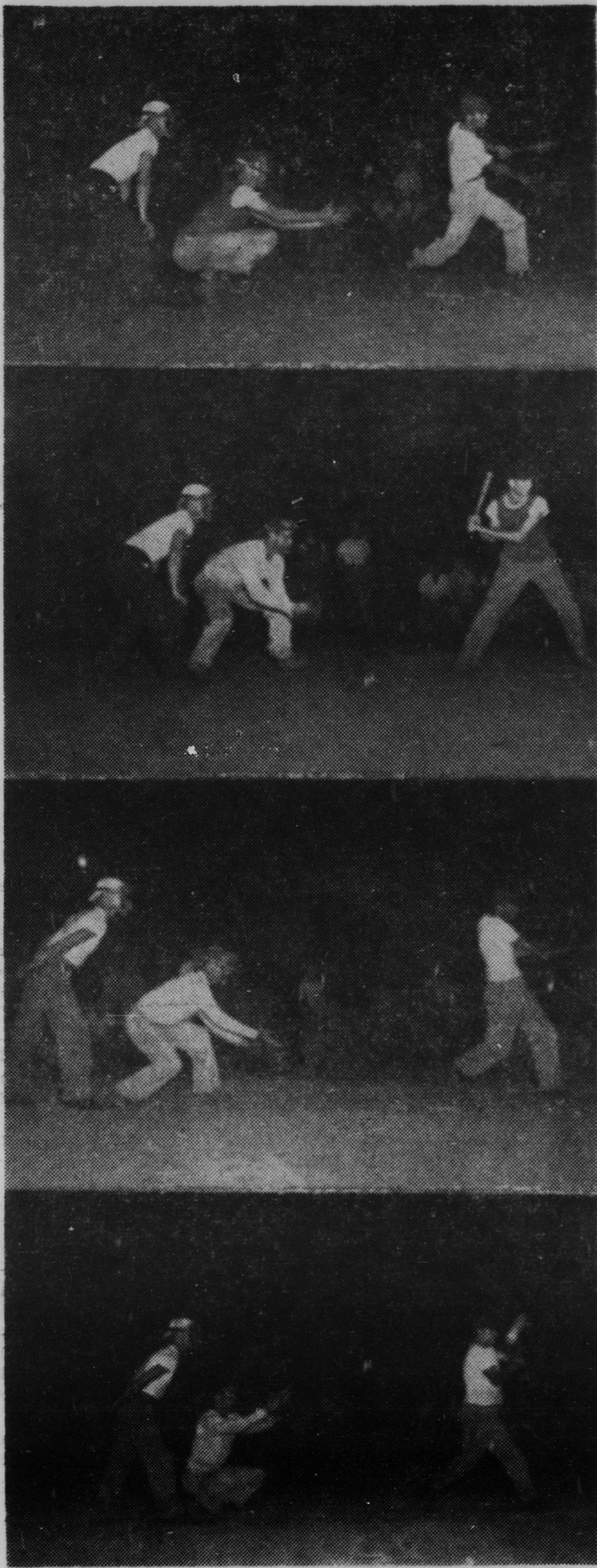

Pilot Team Wins Game from Glory Monday to Win '50 Championship

Pilot's red hot softball team, after dropping a decision last Saturday night to Jack Mitchell's Glory nine, came back strong Monday night to win the Zebulon Open League play-offs by defeating Glory, 9-5.

The Pilot team, managed by Bud Perry, had previously finished the 1950 season leading the Open League, with Glory second and Pearce third.

Accident Policies To Be Available To School Patrons

A Group Accident Insurance Plan under which every enrolled child in the Wake County School System will be covered with accident insurance, will go into effect at the beginning of the school year, subject to each parent's interest and support.

Mr. Benton, Superintendent of Wake County Schools, reported the action today. Mr. Benton said that while the Board of Education and the schools themselves have no legal liability in case of accident or injuries to children in the performance of their normal school duties, it has always been a matter of serious concern to the school people when children were injured and had to be taken to the hospital, often they knew that parents were unable to pay the bills.

He said that this type of coverage will relieve that kind of situation greatly and will assure every child attending school in Wake County adequate medical attention in case any accident occurs to him in connection with any of his school life. It has been the desire for many years among both teachers and parents, according to Mr. Benton that some plan of coverage might be found which would provide financial assistance in payment of medical or hospital expense that might come as a result of such injuries.

Since the cost of accident insurance is higher than the average family feels that it can afford, very few children have the benefit of such coverage, he said.

However, through this new Group School Child Accident Plan, each child will contribute 40c per year. Then all students in the school unit will be adequately provided with accident coverage during the school day.

The plan has been discussed with a number of parents all of whom are enthusiastic in their praise of the action.

Farmers May Purchase PMA Materials Now

Wake County farmers may now secure purchase orders through the County Production and Marketing Administration Office, according to C. M. Hester, PMA secretary, for the following materials:

Permanent Pasture seed which includes Ladino Clover, Orchard Grass, and Fescue; Winter Cover Crop Seed which include Crimson Clover, Austrian Winter Peas, Annual Ryegrass and Vetch; also Alfalfa purchase orders will be furnished.

The following fertilizing materials will be handled under purchase order: 2-12-12, 0-14-14, 0-9-27, 0-14-7, Phosphate and Muriate of Potash.

Farmers are urged to apply for these purchase orders at an early date as the recommended seeding dates for these seed are from September 1 through October 15.

Local Man Lauded For Best Example Of Soil Measures

Joe Tippett, Wake County District Soil Conservation Supervisor, believes in the entire family going all out for soil and water conservation.

Two of his sons are living on adjoining farms, and together they are planning to apply additional soil conservation measures that will strengthen their district soil conservation plan.

Mr. Joe and family are good tobacco farmers but he says, "Much of our land is too steep or too wet for tobacco, so we are seeding it to a permanent pasture mixture to be used for both cattle and hogs."

Meadows in his cultivated fields were prepared and sown to a temporary mixture of oats and lespedeza in the spring. These will be sown to permanent vegetation in September.

All Land Terraced

All of his land has been terraced and was contour cultivated this summer but Mr. Tippett says that is not enough. All of his class three land and part of the class two land will be contour strip-cropped in alternate strips of row crops and close growing crops. On his tobacco land he will follow a rotation of small grain, Ky. 31 tall fescue, and tobacco arranged in alternate strips. A strip rotation with corn, small grain, lespedeza and soybeans will be followed.

Mr. Tippett says that this arrangement of crops will fill his requirements for feed and grain for his livestock and his tobacco acreage. It will provide adequate protection from erosion and will definitely conserve moisture by affording greater absorption of rain water. The Soil Conservation Service personnel is assisting Mr. Tippett in developing the soil conservation program on his farm.

More Pasture Land

Mr. Oscar Senter of Raleigh is planning additional acreage of pasture and alfalfa on class three and class four land. This will fit nicely into his livestock program and is good land use for this red land of his.

Many farmers will sow meadows this fall. They will be sown to various mixtures using one or more of the following plants: alfalfa, orchard grass, tall fescue, and Ladino clover. A few of those who will sow meadows are: Rudolph Robertson, Joe Bell, Carl Davis, Ben Ellington, Thomas Pollard, H. V. Faulkner, H. K. Bailey, Hubert Turner, E. E. Williford, and W. A. Davis, all of Knightdale, N. C.
