Judge Irby Gill Gives Two Heavy Fines In Recorder's Court

A hundred dollar and a fifty dollar fine were top punishments given by Judge Irby D Gill at the Recorder's Court session held on Wednesday. For driving under the influence of alcohol, Ronald Lee Beddingfield was sentenced to six months on the roads suspended on payment of a \$100 fine and costs. His license for driving was revoked for one year.

Robert Crocket Lyons was found not guilty of fleeing from the scene of a collision which caused serious injury without making his identity known, but on a second charge of driving with no operator's license, and driving in a careless and reckless manner, and speeding 80 mph, he earned a sentence of one year in the Wake County jail suspended upon payment of a \$50 fine and costs of the action.
