Local aspirants to fame are being auditioned and some of them may be given a chance to perform on the Youth Opportunity Program which appears in six or seven cities each week.



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Conservation Practices Result in Big Savings To Wake County Farmers

O. R. Whitley of the Knightdale Community signed a soil conservation plan with the Neuse River Soil Conservation District in October. He has already sown a meadow in oats to be followed with lespedeza in the spring. Lime will be applied in the spring, followed in the fall with a mixture of alfalfa and orchard grass.

Mr. Whitley has a very good growth of pines that needs some thinning. He will systematically thin this stand using the wood taken out for fence posts and fuel. Many of the 5 to 8 inch trees which have practically stopped growing due to overcrowding by larger trees will make four to five sevenfoot posts. Many of these trees would die within the next five to ten years.
