

On Educational Problems Smokey Says: Fred Smith Speaks To Zebulon Rotarians

Fred Smith, assistant superintendent of Wake County Schools and former superintendent of Wakelon School, told members of the Zebulon Rotary Club Friday night of some of the problems which face the schools and of recommendations made to help solve the problems. He was introduced by Carlton Mitchell, chairman of the program committee.

Fred began his talk by relating some of the questions asked him concerning the use of the money provided in the recent Wake County bond sale.

When the bonds were proposed, he said, it was emphasized that no increase in the tax rate for school purposes would be necessary. Recently the tax rate for Wake County was increased he said, but the total for the school was decreased 11c, verifying statements made by supporters of the bond is-

Included in the problems which face the schools now are inadequate buildings, insufficient transportation, poor attendance, and low teachers' pay.

The special classes for handicapped children being conducted at Wakelon by Miss Rebecca Talbert were lauded by the speaker. The school here is the first rural school in North Carolina to have such classes and it has proved to be of inestimable value.


