The Rev. Carlton Mitchell, pastor of the Zebulon Baptist Church, was named Man of the Year for this community in voting sponsored state. by the Zebulon Record. Other leaders in the voting were Worth Hinton, president of the Zebulon Lions Club, Wakelon Coach Herb Appenzeller, Mayor R. H. Bridgers and Town Manager Willie B. Hopkins.

The Baptist minister has been a leader in every phase of community activity since coming to Zebulon over three years ago from St. Joseph, Missouri.

The softball league, which saw fifteen teams actively participating last summer, was a direct result of his efforts. In addition, the community recreation program, which was directed by Lee Rhodes as paid supervisor, was brought into being by the Community Council, which Mr. Mitchell heads.

The Community Council, made up of the heads of every organization in Zebulon and the surrounding community, was suggested by Mr. Mitchell, and he was named as its first chairman.

March of Dimes Drive Now in Progress Here; Ed Hales Is Chairman

The 1951 March of Dimes campaign began in Zebulon yesterday and will continue through, January 31, Ed Hales, local chairman, announced. This year, he said, Zebulon and the surrounding community should contribute far more than ever before because the people here know the tragedy which infantile paralysis brings to its homes

During the past three year period from 1948 through 1950 more than twice as many cases of polio were reported than during any similar three-year period.

From 1948 through 1950 patient care alone cost more than \$58,000,-000 in March of Dimes funds. In addition, Hales said, the costs of iron lungs and other needed equipment to combat polio has nearly doubled, increasing the financial problems of polio research.

The families which have been struck by infantile paralysis are the more sincere boosters of the March of Dimes, for they have been aided tremendously.

North Carolina has been one of the chief victims of epidemics of infantile paralysis, and many years more funds were used in contributed by the people of the courses.
