

NOTICE OF ELECTION

In a regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Commissioners for the Town of Zebulon, N. C., at 7:30 o'clock, Monday night, March 5, 1951, with the following present: Mayor R. H. Bridgers; Commissioners, Norman Screws, R. Vance Brown, Howard Beck, R. Wesley Liles, and J. Raleigh Alford.

W. B. Hopkins, Town Clerk, and A. R. House, Town Attorney, were also present.

The following Resolution and Order of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Zebulon, to be held on May 8, 1951, pursuant to the General Statutes of N. C., Chapter No. 160.

Be it resolved; and ordered by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Zebulon, N. C.

SECTION NO. 1

That an election for the purpose of electing a Mayor and five (5) Commissioners of the Town of Zebulon, N. C., to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May; is hereby called and ordered to be held pursuant to Chapter 160 of the General Statutes of North Carolina.

SECTION NO. 2

That the place for holding such Election shall be the Zebulon Fire Station in said Town and the hours in which the polls are to be open, for the purpose of casting ballots in the said Election, shall be from 6:30 a. m. to 6:30 p. m.

SECTION NO. 3

That for the purpose of said Election of the Town Officers to be held on Tuesday after the first Monday in May, Mrs. Ethel Brown

is hereby appointed and designated as registrar and Mr. A. C. Dawson and Mrs. Edna Allman are hereby appointed and designated as Judges of the Election.

SECTION NO. 4

That for the purpose of registration of voters in said Election, the said registrar's books shall be opened on Saturday, April 7, 1951, and shall remain open until April 21, 1951, so that all persons that may be entitled to vote may be personally registered. The said registrar's books shall be open Saturday, April 28, 1951, for the purpose of Challenge Day.

SECTION NO. 5

That all persons desiring to become candidates for the office of Mayor or Commissioner of the Town of Zebulon, shall give notice to Town Clerk of such fact by filing with said Clerk a notice of candidacy at least seven (7) days prior to said Election. The Board of Commissioners may require each candidate to pay a filing fee in an amount to be determined by the Board of Commissioners, not in excess of \$5.00.

SECTION NO. 6

That the Town Clerk be and he is hereby ordered and directed to have printed sufficient ballots according to law; containing the names of all candidates for said office, respectively, who have complied with the law and filed their notice with the Town Clerk, as herein before required.

SECTION NO. 7

That the Town Clerk be and he is hereby ordered and directed to notify the said registrar and judges of Election, herein appointed, in writing, to be served by the Chief

of Police of the Town of Zebulon, North Carolina.

That the Town Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to cause this notice to be published in the local newspaper for four (4) weeks before the Election day.

REAL PROPERTY IN WAKE FOREST TOWNSHIP—TRACT 1: Bounded on the North by L. L. Honeycutt, on the South by Allen Upchurch, on the East by R. E. Sidney Clifton, beginning at a black gum in King's Branch, said said Parham's corner, thence nearly South 54 poles to an Ash on said Branch; thence 88 3/4 West 147 poles to a stake; thence North 56 poles to a stake in said Honeycutt line; thence South 88 degrees East 147 poles to the beginning, containing 50 acres, more or less.

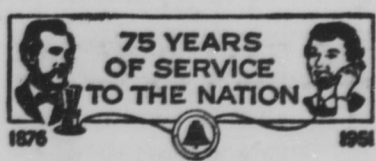
