

## Praised by Ellington

National Farm Safety Week, 22-28, as proclaimed by President Truman, is designed to encourage all farm residents to adopt safe practices on the farm, in the home, at work, in traffic, and a play, according to Ed Ellington, agricultural teacher at Wakelon School.

The long-range objective of the week, says Ellington, is to make farm life safer, happier, and more prosperous.

Based on past averages, the National Safety Council estimates that accidents will kill an average of 48 American farm residents every day during the next year unless extra precautions are taken.

Ellington says most accidents last year involved some violation of a commonsense safety rule. If the accident toll is to be held down this year, he adds, all members of the family must become familiar with and observe the rules of safety in their daily activities.

Farm Safety Week is co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the American Farm Bureau Federation, Farmer's Union, National Grange, Farm Equipment Institute, and many other organizations.

### **Horton Reminds Leaf Producers of Tobacco** Associates '51 Term

Robert Ed Horton, president of the Zebulon Farm Bureau, announced today that the 5th Annual Meeting of the Flue-Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation will be held in Pullen Hall, State College, Raleigh, at 11:00 a. m., June 29.

President Horton said that Dr. Paul D. Sanders, Richmond, Va., Editor of the Southern Planter, will be principal speaker on the program, along with Stabilization's President Carl T. Hicks, Walstonburg, and General Manager L. T. Weeks, Raleigh, who will read their annual progress reports to the delegates.

"The 393,000 member Stabilization Corporation," Horton pointed out, "was developed by the North Carolina Farm Bureau in 1946 as a non-profit organization for the purpose of setting up the machinery through which tobacco growers are to obtain at least 90 percent of parity for their leaf on the warehouse floor. Since this organization was founded, it has taken under loan over 500 million pounds of flue-cured tobacco. Operating funds are borrowed from the Commodity Credit Corporation and repaid as Stabilization re-sells the tobacco taken under loan."

#### Owned by Growers

President Horton said that one of the outstanding features of this organization, is that it is owned and operated by the tobacco growers in the five flue cured States and is a perfect example of what can be done when a group sets out to provide a self-help program designed to overcome problems that have proved costly down through the

He urged that "every member, why possibly can, should attend this important meeting in Raleigh, June 29. Our tobacco program is good but we still have many problems to iron out in the bright leaf belts."

Horton added that Stabilization already refunded growers substantial payments in dividends for the 1947 flue-cured crop, and will continue operation on this yearly basis.
