### LOCAL BOND SALE TO CONTINUE UNTIL TUESDAY

According to an announcement by Fred Dixon, Chairman of the County U. S. Savings Bonds Committee \$326,068.75 worth of Series E, F and G Defense Bonds have been purchased in Wake county since the current Bond drive began September 3 through October 27.

The Drive continues through November 13 and the county quota is \$375,000, the chairman said.

With 80 per cent of the 10week's reporting period gone 86 .-9% of sales quota has been attained. 15 counties in North Carolina have exceeded their quotas. 10 counties has achieved 80% of their quotas and 78 counties have reached 50% or better.

"There is still time for Wake county to go over the top," the chairman said. "In order to show the many young men in our county who have joined the fighting forces that we at home are endeavoring to do our part in the national defense effort, our county must exceed its quota."
