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Campaign for Funds Is Extended for Week For Community Chest

A goal of \$1,500 has been set for the Zebulon Community Chest campaign for funds, and the drive will be extended into next week in a special effort to obtain this amount, announced Gilbert Beck, Chairman of the organization, late yesterday.

Mrs. Harold Pippin reported contributions from Wakefield amounting to \$20.00. Harold Taylor, working with the colored people, reported \$50.00.

Amounts collected by other solicitors had not been reported yesterday, the chairman said.

The goal was established by the Chest chairman after conferring with members of the Board of Directors and determining the minimum amount which could be allotted to the agencies participating.

The funds collected will be divided among the boy and girl Scout organizations, the community recreation program, and emergency welfare cases.

Pearce WMS to Hold Mission Study Course

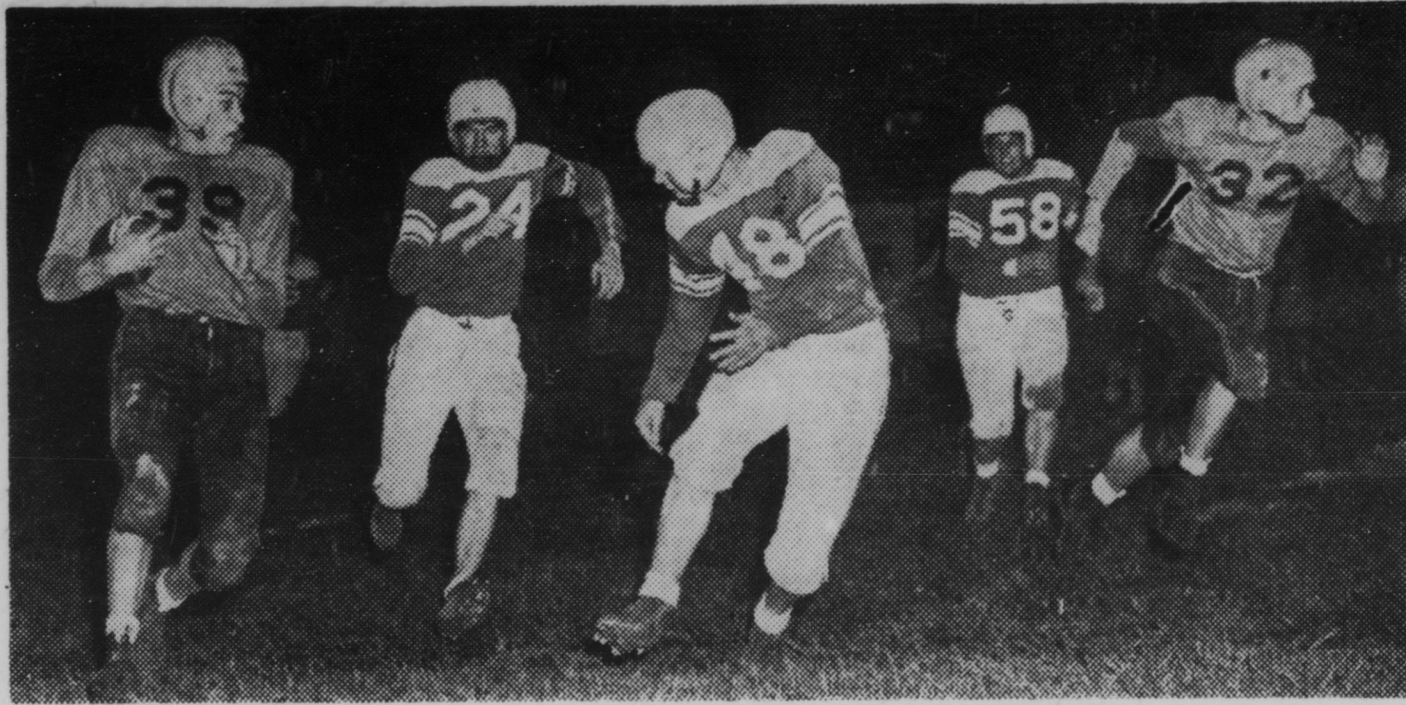
