LONNIE ALFORD DIES FRIDAY IN HOSPITAL AT FAYETTEVILLE

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in Burlington for Lonnie M. Alford, 53, who died at the veterans' hospital at Fayetteville last Friday morning after two years of failing health. Interment was in the veterans section of Pine Hill Cemetery. A native of Franklin County, he was the son of the late Sidney A. and Mary Powell Alford and the husband of Mrs. Ingle Alford of Burlington.

Mr. Alford was a member of Southside Baptist Church and the Walter B. Ellis Post of the American Legion. He was a veteran of World War I and received the Purple Heart for wounds received while serving in France and Belgium with the 120th Infantry. In addition to his wife he is survived by five daughters, one sister, and six brothers, including M. S. Alford and S. C. Alford of Zebulon and J. T. Alford of Middlesex.

Wake Election Planned Thursday

Farmers of Wake County on Thursday, December 13, will elect Committeemen who will administer the Agricultural Conservation Allotment, Marketing Quota and Program, Price Support, Acreage the Production Program in 1952. Polling places will be open at 8:30 a. m., for the purpose of nominating persons for committeemen. The nominating meeting will be held 30 minutes before the balloting begins at each voting place. At this election, farmers will

be voting for three members for Community Committeemen and two Alternates, also a delegate to the County Convention which will be held in the Wake County PMA Office on Friday, December 14. The polls will be open for voting from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m. No farmer who is eligible to vote should pass up the opportunity to cast a ballot for his choice. Polling places in Little River Township include the Zebulon Town Office and J. R. Fowler's Store. In Marks Creek the polling place is the Wendell Court Room.

White Way Ceremony Held, Another Planned for Friday

In a small ceremony held Thursday at the switch located behind the Zebulon Drug Company, Ralph Talton, head of the Zebulon office of Carolina Power & Light Company, presented Mayor Worth Hinton with the key to the switch which controls the brilliantly lighted "white way" recently completed by the power company for the Town of Zebulon.

Mayor Hinton expressed the appreciation of the townspeople for the hard work done by Ed Kitchings and his fellow workers in expediting the installation of the lights. The main business street of the town was flooded with light at 5:22 p. m., when the Mayor threw the switch for the first time. The new lights line each side of Arendell Avenue from Gannon Avenue to Vance Street, and extend a half block off Arendell Avenue in each direction down Horton Avenue and Vance Street. The poles on which the lights are mounted are uniform in size and height, greatly improving the appearance of the business section, which before was cluttered with power lines criss-crossing the street. The old poles will be removed from the street this week in time for the ceremonies inaugurating the Christmas season Friday evening.

For 22 years he served as chairman of the Yadkin County Board and Education, and for the past 30 years he has served as treasurer of the Boonville Baptist Church.

A booklet which will contain the words of the Christmas carols to be sung will be given to every person attending the program. Miss Elizabeth Salmon will be in charge of the music.

MITCHELL TALKS AT ROTARY

The importance of cooperation between the towns and its surrounding community was emphasized by Rotarian Carlton Mitchell, pastor of the Zebulon Baptist Church, at the meeting of the Zebulon Rotary Club held Friday night.
