Sprite Barbee Is Named Man of Year at Tarboro

G. Sprite Barbee, Jr., son of Dr. and Mrs. G. S. Barbee of Zebulon, has received the Junior Chamber of Commerce Award as the outstanding young man of the year in Tarboro. The presentation was made last Wednesday at the Tarboro Jaycees annual award dinner.

The fifth man to receive the award in Tarboro, Sprite was cited for outstanding service in and to his community, personal character and ability.

The award was presented by Senator L. H. Fountain who spent a full five minutes in recalling the activities in which the Man of the Year is engaged.

The Senator pointed out that Mr. Barbee "is a man whose hobby is service, and in addition to his active participation in the Red Cross, the American Legion, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Man of the Year was also instrumental in obtaining an increase of two million pounds in the slaughtering allotment of Edgecombe County."

A native of Zebulon, Sprite moved to Tarboro in the summer of 1946 and became county sanitarian. He is married and the father of two boys. A member of Tarboro's Civic Council and the St. James Methodist Church, he is also one of the outstanding members of the Tarboro Lions Club.

OPS SERVICES EXPANDED

Field service facilities of the Raleigh OPS will be available to the businessmen of the Zebulon area on Monday, February 18 when Robert Wells will be present to assist with OPS regulations.

Special emphasis is being given new businesses, and any contemplating opening a new firm should contact the Raleigh OPS as far in advance of the opening date as possible, because any new business must have the ceiling prices approved by OPS before it can legally operate, the Raleigh office explained. Any business which

opened since December 19, 1950, without having established the prices with OPS is urged to contact the Raleigh office.

The Raleigh OPS said that compliance with Ceiling Price Regulation 34 was extremely low in this area. CPR 34 covers various types of businesses rendering services to the public for which a fee is charged.

This field service is a plan devised by the Raleigh OPS in an effort to make information easily available to the public of eastern Carolina.
