

Zebulon Recorder Has Many Cases to Try At Local Courtroom

Wilmer Dunn was publicly drunk on the streets of Zebulon and resisted arrest when the officers tried to take him in. As a result of his action, Judge Irby Gill ordered him to pay a total \$200 in fines plus the costs of the court or else serve six months on the roads. When established, the teenage program was to be a trial program which the members of the Woman's Club hoped would be followed by a bigger communitysponsored project.

A report of the work which was released this week through Mrs. Eugene Privett stated:
