The main body of troops of the famed 30th Infantry Division began arriving at Ft. McClellan, Ala., at 4 a.m. Monday, and the men began immediate preparations for two weeks of the most intense field training given National Guard units since the end of World War

Zebulon's Battery A arrived about 5 a.m., unloading their baggage and immediately went to their tents to begin the first day of train-
