Broken harness and equipment frequently contribute to accidents involving horses. Periodic cleaning and oiling of harness increases the tensile strength and reduces the hazard of breaking. Check the neck yokes, single trees, double trees, eveners, and tongues and other accessories and repair any weakness or flaw at once.

Cows and steers also account for many farm accidents. Kickings were the most frequent occurrence in accidents involving cows and steers.

Index of prices received by farmers declined 2 per cent from mid-August to mid-September. Prices paid by farmers declined 1 per cent.

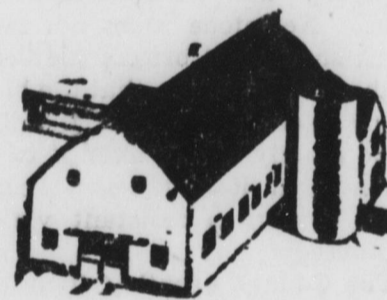
