Approval Is Given Housing Authority By County Board

The Board of County Commissioners meeting in the Wake County Court House Monday, voted to create a housing authority for Wake County.

This authority will permit the erection of low-rent housing projects in the area of Wake County outside Raleigh, especially in those towns which desire them.

A delegation of Wendell people were on hand to advance the reasons why such an authority should be created. James H. Parish, who is chairman of the committee for obtaining the housing for Wendell, spoke in behalf of the project. E. H. Moser, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, also pointed out to the Commissioners the need of such an authority to aid in alleviating insanitary dwellings in the rural areas of the

W. A. Scarboro, mayor of the Town of Wendell, told the commissioners the need of low-rent housing accommodations in Wendell and other parts of the county was real, and there was no valid reason for any person in Raleigh objecting to it, especially when it was not to cost the county any

Others who spoke before the commisioners for the project were the Rev. Earle J. Rogers, Hyman Katz and J. B. Bilisoly. Waymon Morgan, local colored leader, assured the commissioners that some of the colored dwellings in Wendell were certainly unfit for human habitation.
