### Haywood Jones Is Speaker at Rotary; Tells of Digitalis

To illustrate the many interesting aspects of his work as pharmacist, Haywood Jones told the members of the Zebulon Rotary Club last Friday night about digitalis, commonly called foxglove, which has gained world renown for its use as a heart stimulant particularly useful in treating dropsy.

The drug may be administered in many forms, and Haywood had samples of pure digitalis, capsules, liquid, and tablets for examination by his audience.

Dr. Ben Thomas reported that the effects of digitalis are one of the most dramatic of any drug. Some people subject to attacks of dropsy must take doses continually. The drug slows and strengthens the heart beat, providing better circulation.

In answer to the question of what effect digitalis would have on a well person, the speaker reported it would likely produce nausea which will wear off.
