Foster D. Finch, Zebulon attorney and fertilizer dealer, was named Solicitor of the Zebulon Recorder's Court and attorney for the Town of Zebulon by the newlyinstalled Board of Commissioners on Monday night, June 1. He replaces A. R. House in the only job change made by the commissioners.

The change was decided by a secret vote taken after Commissioner R. Vance Brown nominated House for aonther term and Commissioner R. Wesley Liles nominated Finch.

A lengthy discussion followed the nominations before the secret ballot was taken. The commissioners split three-to-two in favor of Finch.

Attorney Finch served as Solicitor of the Zebulon Recorder's Court for ten years beginning in 1932. He was succeeded by Attorney House, who continued in the office until Monday night.

As soon as the vote naming Finch to be Solicitor was taken, Wesley Liles moved he be appointed town attorney. The Board (Contiued on Page 4)
