

Funeral services for Dr. Carl Wendell Bell, well-known Raleigh physician, closely related to Wendell residents, who died of a heart attack at his summer home in Morehead City early Monday morning, were held Tuesday afternoon from his Raleigh home at 1313 College Place, at 4:30 o'clock.

Native of Wakefield

A native of Wakefield in Wake County, Dr. Bell was a son of Dr. George Manley Bell and Helen Tempie Richardson Bell. He was educated at Wake Forest, receiv-Maryland.

During World War I, Dr. Bell served in France with the U.S. Army Medical Corps and was a captain at the time of his discharge from the service.

The Raleigh physician was a former president of the Raleigh Academy of Medicine and was a member of the Wake County Medical Society, the State Medical Society, the American Medical Association, and Phi Chi Medical Fraa 32nd Degree Mason, a Shriner Legion.
