

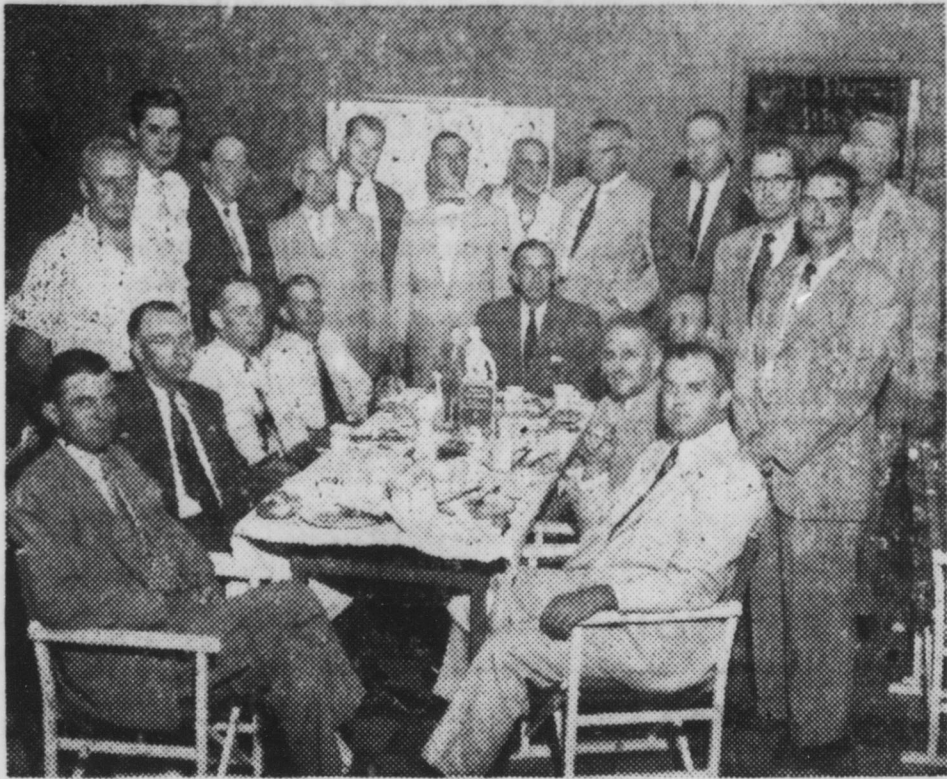

Recreation Notes

The summer recreation program ended Friday, August 7, with a square and round dance, which was one of the weekly dances sponsored by the Recreation Commission. The dances were held in the Wakelon gym. Although there was no band, large crowds danced to the recorded music heard over Mayor Hinton's amplifying system. The dances were one phase of the summer program that lasted for six weeks. Another part of the program for adults was the softball games. Three nights a week spectators gathered to see games. Four men's teams formed one league and two girls' teams formed another. With the two leagues there were two games each night.

Zebulon boys organized a Junior team and played two afternoons a week here and out of town.

Softball, however, was not the only sport offered. Twice a week crowds averaging thirty children went to the Wake Forest Municipal Swimming Pool. Transportation was furnished by parents and other people interested in the program. They had a recreational period in the water for two hours. Bad weather did not keep them out, although the nine Zebulon folks were the only ones in the Wake Forest pool on the last Thursday. About seventeen children took instructional swimming at Lake Glad for two weeks. The Red Cross sponsored this program. (Continued on Page 8)

Command Inspection to Be Monday; Division Artillery Commander Here

Lt. Col. Edward Yarborough, commander of the 113th Field Artillery Battalion, and members of his staff will visit Zebulon's Battery A at the last drill to be held this month on August 24. He will observe the training and readiness of men in the unit during the two hours of instruction.

The visit is a regular quarterly command inspection by members of the battalion staff.

At the drill last Monday night General Edward Griffin, commander of the 30th Infantry Division Artillery, was a visitor during the drill period. He observed the class in map reading taught by Kenneth D. Lloyd and Cpl. Herbert Privette, and inspected plans of the National Guard armory being constructed here.

General Griffin and First Sergeant Sidney Holmes of Battery A served together in combat during World War II. At that time the general was battalion commander and First Sergeant Holmes was battalion sergeant major.

Sgt. Kenneth Talmadge Pearce, communications chief, expects to leave September 9 for Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, to attend the advanced communications course. Sgt. Pearce is an honor graduate of the basic enlisted communications course.

Men from 17 to 18½ years of age are being accepted for membership in the National Guard, according to WO Johnsey P. Arnold, who is on duty at the armory from Monday through Friday of each week.

Decision Planned Tonight On United Fund Proposal

Tonight at 7:45 the citizens of the Zebulon community will have an opportunity to replace the multiplicity of fund drives which continually plague this neighborhood with a single United Fund encompassing all the agencies which seek operating funds from local residents. The important meeting will be held in the Municipal Building.

Urgent invitations have been extended to everyone possible to attend the meeting, according to J. C. Debnam, president of the Community Chest. He urged that every interested person participate so that whatever action is taken will be the will of the community.

The meeting was called following a discussion by the Board of Directors of the Community Chest last week on the possibility of establishing a United Fund here.

Strictly Local

Harold Bronfil, field representative of the United Red Feather organization, met with the Community Chest leaders and explained the United Fund operation to them. He emphasized that the United Fund can be strictly a local operation, with its budget and expenditures planned by local people.

Mr. Bronfil will be present tonight to answer any questions pertaining to the United Fund.

Included in the number of agencies which may participate in the United Fund are those which now receive benefits from the Community Chest plus a number for which individual drives are conducted throughout the year.

Among those participating in the Zebulon Community Chest are the Boy and Girl Scouts, local welfare, the United Service Fund and Free free school lunches.

Good Cooperation Cited Necessary For New Industry

There were plenty of speakers and plenty of folks to listen to them talk on Tuesday night at the industrial development forum conducted by the Commerce and Industry Committee of the North Carolina Board of Conservation and Development in the Wakelon school auditorium. Over 600 people crowded into the auditorium, coming from the nine counties for whom the meeting was held.

Governor William Umstead, making his first public night appearance since he took office, was present to help launch his "get more industry for North Carolina" program.

Community Cooperation

The governor appealed for community cooperation all over North Carolina in his campaign to develop the industrial economy of North Carolina. His speech was the highlight of the meeting, presided over by Robert M. Hanes, chairman of the Commerce and Industry Committee.

Mayor Worth Hinton presented the governor with a huge key to the town at the beginning of the meeting. The Rev. Vernon Brooks, pastor of the Wakefield Baptist Church, gave the invocation.

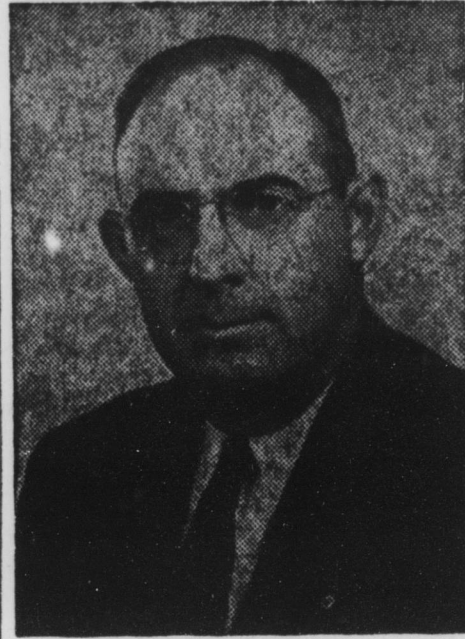
G. E. Garnhart of Pittsburgh, Pa., director of real estate and insurance for Westinghouse Electric Corporation, which now is building a \$10,000,000 plant just north of Raleigh, described the problems facing industry in selecting a community for factory plant operation.

Six-Point Program

Mr. Garnhart outlined a six-point program which he said has been helpful in other communities in the development of new industry. The six points included:

1) Make sure community leaders want industry and are willing to provide utility services to the factory site;

2) Conduct a survey to obtain information on the men and woman (Continued on Page 8)

Traffic Law Violations Fill Docket Of Last Session of Recorder's Court

Violations of the motor vehicle laws brought most of the defendants into Judge Irby D. Gill's Recorder's Court last Wednesday, with the charges ranging from running stop signs to driving a tractor under the influence of an intoxicant.

J. Lee Holleman of Holly Springs was fined \$35 and costs for operating a truck in excess of the 45 miles per hour speed limit.

John Baxter Chamblee, Jr., of Wendell was fined the costs for failing to stop at a stop sign.

James Wiley Milles of Zebulon was fined \$10 and costs for running two stop signs.

L. W. Bunn, of Zebulon, was fined \$200 and costs for driving a farm tractor on the state highways while drunk. He took an appeal and bond for his appearance in the

Superior Court was set at \$300.

Bennie Lindbergh Whitley of Route 2 was fined \$50 and costs for speeding.

John Linford Blalock of Wendell was fined \$35 and costs for careless and reckless driving.

For speeding in Zebulon, Austin Willie Perry was fined \$25 and costs.

Jesse Robert Hicks of Wendell was found not guilty of careless and reckless driving.

James Quenton Herndon of Mt. Gilead was fined \$100 and costs for drunken driving.

Ula Hubert Coyart of Wilson had his bond forfeited when he failed to appear to answer to a charge of speeding.

Six defendants were involved in a single altercation, the cases (Continued on Page 8)
