> There is a limit to the amount walk paving, the Commissioners decided, and a minimum standard paved sidewalks must meet. When it is able, the Town of Zebulon will pay 70c per running foot toward paving walks four feet wide, four inches thick, and six inches thick at drives which meet the town's specifications.

Petition Received

A petition was received from property owners living on the east side of Church Street between Franklin and McIver Streets to have their sidewalks paved, and the Commissioners voted unanimously to approve the work according to the new policy. J. R. Sawyer and Thurman Murray presented the request.

While the water supply for Zebulon is adequate, trouble is developing in the filter bed at the water plant, so the Board asked the clerk to check on what needs doing to remedy the situation. The sand in the filter bed is old and no longer filters the water as fast as needed. Clerk Hopkins said it will probably have to be replaced.
