## Traffic Violations, **Alcohol Use Again Fill Zebulon Court**

Frank Hodge of Route 2, Zebulon, found that it is expensive in time and money to become involved with the law and face justice in the Zebulon Recorder's Court. On Wednesday Judge Irby Gill found Hodge guilty on four counts.

For having an accident involving personal injury to others and failing to give proper information and render assistance, Hodge was sentenced to six months suspended on payment of \$40 fine and costs.

For driving with improper brakes, he was sentenced to 30 days suspended on payment of the

payment of the costs.

For driving with no operator's license, he was fined \$25 and costs.


