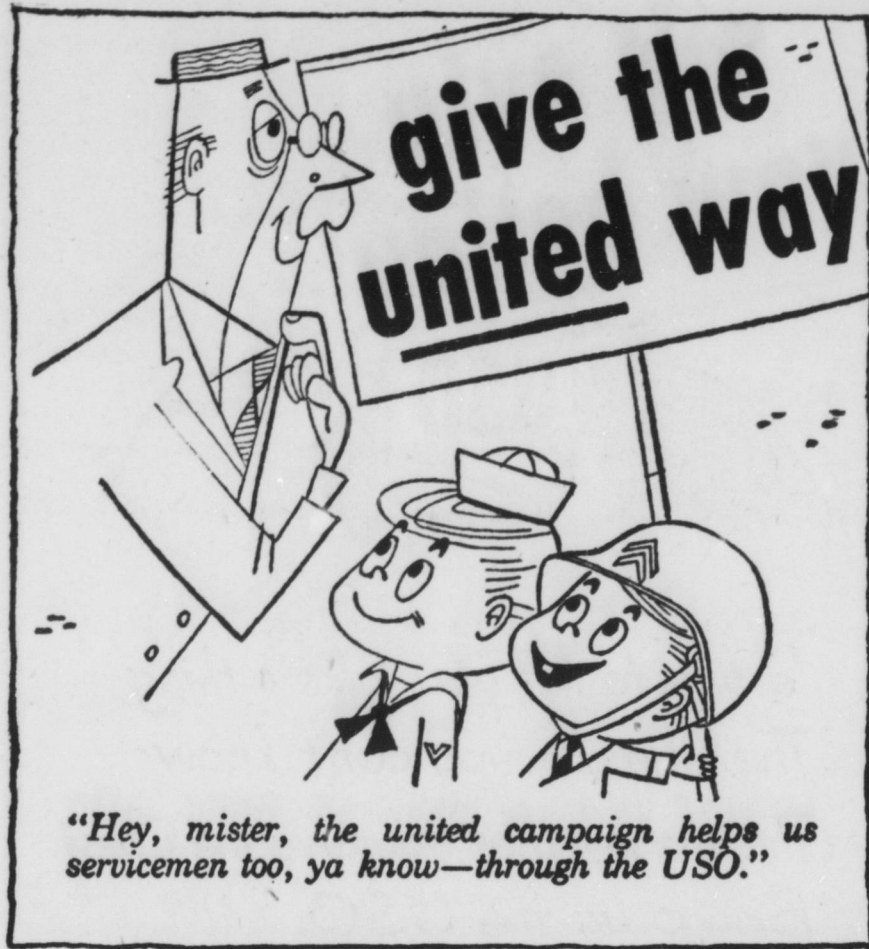

Rolesville School's Fall Festival Now in Progress

The fifth annual Fall Festival, sponsored by the Rolesville P. T. A. will be held October 29 and 30 in the Rolesville School. This festival is sponsored to produce means of providing added aspects of learning for the boys and girls of our school district.

Approximately 1000 people are expected to attend and enjoy the attractions that the Festival affords. Much enthusiasm plus a lot of work is being evidenced by the entire school district. The patrons, along with the children, look forward to this gala occasion each year.

The student body will be divided into four departments with two departments being responsible for a program on stage each night. The "midway" will be crowded with booths and concession stands of various types — fortune telling,

fishing, pastry shop, weight guessing, basketball throwing, hot dog stands, and many contests to encourage competition. The midway will open at 5:30 p. m. each day and close promptly at 8:00 p. m., for the stage show in the high school auditorium. These will open again after the show and run until 7.

Friday evening in the cafeteria beginning at 5:00 o'clock, the P. T. A. will sponsor a pig and chicken barbecue dinner with all the trimmings for \$1.00 per plate. The P. T. A.'s goal for this dinner is 1000 plates.

Commissioners Debate, Pay Night Visit to Wendell, Buy Ford Twice

The Zebulon Town Board on Wednesday night voted to support their own decision made Monday night and go ahead with the purchase of a Ford V8 police car from Wendell Motor Company. The action came at the end of a special meeting called by Mayor Worth Hinton as a result of heated discussion of the Monday night action by citizens of Zebulon.

The action amounted to a second reversal of the Board's decision. Earlier in the evening the Board accepted return of the signed bill of sale held by the Wendell Motor Company, and Joe Henderson

accepted the keys and left the meeting to take the car back to Wendell.

The apparent decision of the group was to start from scratch on the purchase of the car, with an advertisement providing that the Board should have the right to reject any and all bids, a clause which is customarily inserted in such advertising, but was omitted from the request for bids which appeared in the *Record* earlier this month.

The earlier cancellation of the agreement came after appearances

Federal Check Nov. 5th

With ten days remaining before the annual Federal Inspection, members of Battery A, Zebulon's National Guard unit, are busy preparing for the big event which plays an important part in determining the grade given Battery A for its year's work.

The Inspector General, during his visit here November 5, will determine the military knowledge and morale of the men, whether administrative and supply procedures are adequate, and the condition of the clothing and equipment issued the unit.

The inspection will require all afternoon and evening. During the afternoon he will confer with Battery Commander Barrie Davis and Unit Administrator Johnsey Arnold and will check all records and equipment.

During the evening drill, the inspector will question the men, inspect the men in formation, and observe the classroom training. Following the drill, he will meet with the Battery Commander, officers and non-commissioned officers of the unit to discuss his observations.

Traffic Violations, Alcohol Use Again Fill Zebulon Court

Frank Hodge of Route 2, Zebulon, found that it is expensive in time and money to become involved with the law and face justice in the Zebulon Recorder's Court. On Wednesday Judge Irby Gill found Hodge guilty on four counts.

For having an accident involving personal injury to others and failing to give proper information and render assistance, Hodge was sentenced to six months suspended on payment of \$40 fine and costs.

For driving with improper brakes, he was sentenced to 30 days suspended on payment of the costs.

For running a stop sign he was sentenced to 30 days suspended on payment of the costs.

For driving with no operator's license, he was fined \$25 and costs.

Wade Jack Smith was in court on three counts. He was sentenced to 60 days to be suspended on payment of the costs for being drunk and disorderly and engaging in an affray in Zebulon, the sentence to be suspended on payment of \$25 fine and costs.

For damaging personal property by throwing a brick through a vehicle window Smith was sentenced to four months to be suspended on payment of \$50 fine and costs. For assault with a brick he was sentenced to 60 days to be suspended on payment of \$50 fine and costs.

Frances Saunders Bowden of Virginia was fined \$100 and costs for drunken driving in Zebulon. She took an appeal and bond was set at \$200.

Had Improper Exhaust

Jimmie C. Nowell, of Raleigh was fined the costs for having improper exhaust system on his car.

Ronald Junior Parker of Raleigh, guilty of speeding 65 miles per hour, was sentenced to 60 days suspended on payment of \$25 fine and costs. An appeal was taken and bond set at \$100.

Grover Walls of Zebulon, guilty of drunkenness in a public place of business, was sentenced to 30 days suspended on payment of \$5 and costs and on condition he remain of good behavior for one year.

Gledwood Morgan of Zebulon, guilty of public drunkenness, was sentenced to 30 days. Guilty of giving a worthless check for \$5, he received a second sentence of 30 days to run concurrently with the first.

James Carey Hagwood of Fayetteville paid \$10 fine and costs for failing to give a proper turn signal.

James Nathan Cooke of Route 2, Wendell, was found not guilty of careless and reckless driving.

Charles Kenneth Glover of Spring Hope paid \$25 fine and cost for speeding.

Estee Clark of Sharpsburg was fined \$50 and costs for speeding.

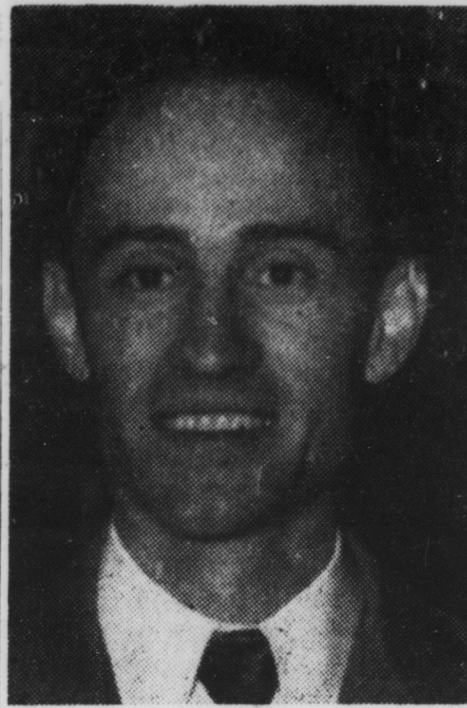
Roy Shelby Price of Route 4, was fined \$15 and costs for parking on the traveled portion of the highway.

Rose Johnson Lewis of Route 2 was sentenced to 60 days suspended on payment of \$25 and costs for speeding 65 miles per hour.
