Rotary Club Told Of Garden Plans

One of the most ambitious projects ever attempted by the Zebulon Garden Club has been adopted for the next two years, Mrs. Ferd Davis, president of the group, told members of the Zebulon Rotary Club last Friday night. The Garden Club plans to supervise the landscaping and beautification of the National Guard armory site.

Mrs. Davis gave this information during her report on the history and work of the local Garden Club. The talk was one of a series on community organizations.

The Garden Club was active in Zebulon during the years before World War II, but disbanded during the war so that its members could devote their time to rolling bandages and other war work.

Following a business session, members gave Mrs. Wall a surprise shower.


Plans were made for the family Christmas party which will be held this Wednesday night in the Woman's Clubhouse.

Taxes, Interest **Due January 4th**

Prospects for early construction of a factory building for a proposed new cutting and sewing operation in Zebulon are good enough for people to start putting their money up, C. V. Whitley, chairman of the industrial committee of the Zebulon Chamber of Commerce, announced yesterday.

The announcement came in the form of letters to backers of the proposed industry, which calls for payment to be made on checks for interest and tax money on January

The text of Mr. Whitley's letter follows:

It now appears that the manufacturing plant for Zebulon is a reality. There are a few details to be worked out; however, no hitch is contemplated in the remainder of the negotiations. We do lack some over a thousand dollars having the required amount to meet taxes and interest necessary to carry out our part of the agreement. Some of the solicitors have not been able to complete their work and we hope this will be done right away as we now need to bring this to a conclusion without further delay.

Grading on the land should begin in a few days and within a very short time - probably two weeks, work will begin on the building. With favorable weather conditions the contractor estimates that it will take something like 4 months to complete the building.

The building with adjoining offices and other enclosed space will cover something like 34,000 sq. feet. It will be of brick veneer construction and substantially built throughout. We believe the appearance of the building will be unusually attractive for a manufacturing plant.

The completed building with land and other necessary requirements will cost considerably more than was first estimated and some more than we thought as late as 10 days ago. The committee working with Mr. Rosenstock, one of our local concerns and the contractors was able to work out revised specifications and also to get concessions that brought the price down considerably from the original bids. Our investigations show that the square foot cost is much less than buildings of this type usually cost.
