voted to build the main to the town its regular December meeting limits down Sycamore Street.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Worth Hinton, Commissioners R. Vance Brown, Howard Beck, Wesley Liles, Wilbur Debnam, and Frank Wall; Attorney Foster Finch; and Town Manager W. B. Hopkins.

Commissioner Brown made the motion to build the new water main. It received a second from Commissioner Beck, and was carried without opposition.

M. H. Alford appeared before the Board and requested that Sycamore Street be opened from Whitley Street to the city limits. No action was taken on this suggestion.
