## CONGRATULATED IN KOREA



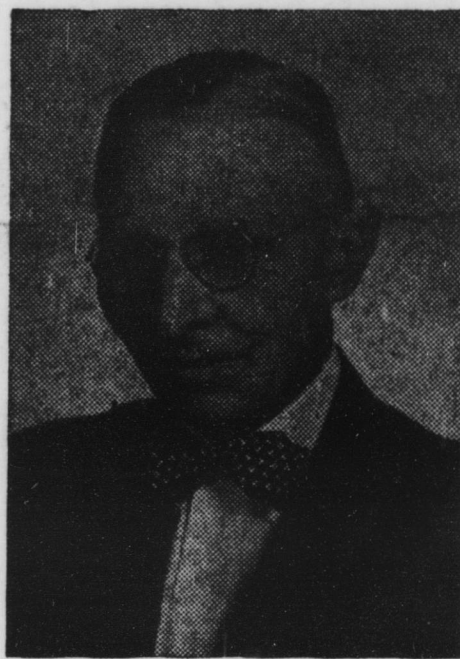
