Mrs. Rountree explained the State Farm Census to the Zebulon Record for its readers this week.

She said the main purpose of the State Farm Census, now in its 35th year, is to meet the local demand for annual county statistics on agriculture in greater geographic detail than has been provided by any other service. The federal agriculture census does not provide data by counties at sufficiently frequent intervals to meet the statistical needs of the county and state agricultural agencies, and other users of this service.

Demand for Statistics

There is a strong demand for agricultural statistics covering farming operations on the county level. This information is requested and used by individuals, public agencies, and by local groups as well as state and national organi-
