Net Income Report **Guide Sheet Available**

A special guide sheet to help self-employed persons in correctly reporting their net income for social security tax purposes is now available, John Ingle, manager of the Raleigh social security office, announced today.

This leaflet, "Helpful Guides on Reporting Your Self-Employment Tax," he said, has been issued by the Social Security Administration to supplement instructions given with the Federal income tax

Pointing out that social security benefits payable to a self-employed person and his family in his old age, or to his dependents in case of his death, are based on earnings credited to his social security account, Ingle stressed the importance of correct reporting. "It costs the worker as well as the Government additional time and expense when an incomplete or incorrect return has to be straightened out,"
