Fault at Clinic

Some interesting facts and figures were compiled at the Wakelon Pre-School Clinic held last week, attended by 66 children and 62 parents, according to Wakelon School Superintendent W. R. Whittenton.

Of those present, 13 children were found without defects, the clinic revealed.

Defective Teeth

Defective temporary teeth were found in 39 children, and three children had defective teeth corrected. Eighteen of the children had no dental defects.

Throats in 46 of the children were found allright. Three were advised to have tonsils removed and five already had their tonsils removed.

Two of the children were reported to have had rheumatic fever, and one had asthma.

One was referred for further examination including his eyes, and one reported orthopedic condition.


