Little River Precinct Meeting to Be Held Tomorrow to Name Committee

Precinct meetings in Little River Township will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 p. m., according to Chairman J. Wilbur Bunn of the Wake County Democratic Executive Committee. The two meetings in Little River will be held at the Zebulon fire station and at Mac Perry's Store at Mitchell's Mill.

Each precinct will elect a precinct executive committee of five members. At least two of the members shall be women, and either the precinct chairman or vice chairman shall be a woman.

Both precincts will elect delegates to the county convention, which will be held in the courthouse in Raleigh at noon Saturday, May 15. The precincts are entitled to one county convention delegate for each 25 votes it cast for the Democratic nominee for Governor in the last election.

Congressman Harold D. Cooley will be the keynote speaker for the county convention.

The county convention will elect Wake's delegates to the State Convention, which will be held in Raleigh on Thursday, May 20. The

county is entitled to one delegate and one alternate for every 150 votes cast for the Democratic gubernatorial nominee in the last general election.

The Wake County Democratic Executive Committee is composed of the chairman of each of the precinct committees. The Wake Committee will meet immediately after the county convention to organize for the next two years. Present officers are Chairman Bunn, Mrs. Flossie Cole Moore, vice chairman; and Herbert O'Keef, secretary.

Chamblee on Wake Lennon Committee; Privette, Horton, Richardson Helping Kerr Scott

The campaign for United States Senator in Wake County took on added interest this week with the appointment of a local filling station operator as assistant county manager for A. A. Lennon and the naming of three Little River Township farmers as members of Kerr Scott's county committee.

Fred Chamblee was named as Lennon's number two worker in Wake County by James H. Pou Bailey earlier this week. Chamblee is no stranger to politics, having served on the staff of Senator Robert R. Reynolds in Washington during World War II.

The Scott appointees are Avon Privette, Robert Ed Horton, and Garland L. Richardson, whose appointments have been announced by Colonel J. W. Harrelson, Wake chairman. Other Little River Township committee members will be announced later.

Former Mayor

Privette is a former mayor of Zebulon, now a member of the county ABC board, and is a merchant and farmer. Horton is a Farm Bureau official and a farmer; he headed the local fire truck proj-

ect as AFC chairman. Richardson is an insurance agent and farmer, and is also active in Farm Bureau activities.

The Lennon manager in Wake County is an incumbent state senator, who decided not to seek reelection after James Poyner announced his candidacy for the same position. Bailey has opened county headquarters on Fayetteville (See POLITICS, Page 10)

Truce with Crime Impossible, Lions Told by Sheriff

"We cannot have a truce with criminals," Sheriff Robert Pleasants told members of the Zebulon Lions Club last night in a short talk on law enforcement. "Their challenge to society is formidable and perilous," he continued.

The Sheriff described the primary duty of law enforcement officers as "guardians of the public welfare."

Force Understaffed

Telling of the work of his department, the Sheriff said his force is understaffed but hard-working.

"The legislature passes laws and the courts provide justice," the speaker said, "yet our whole legislative and judicial system would collapse without the able support of your law enforcement officer."

The value of his men was emphasized by the Sheriff when he said, "Law enforcement officers protect our privileges with their sacrifices. Their glory is our triumph — since their victory is our safety," he concluded.

James Alford was elected Wednesday night to be Commander of the Zebulon American Legion Post, succeeding Johnsey P. Arnold. The new Commander has served during the past year as vice commander and will take office in July.

Sidney Holmes was named vice commander, and Gilford Bufkin is the new adjutant, succeeding Bill Perry.

Dog Vaccination Clinics Begin Here Wednesday

The Zebulon municipal building will be the site of one of the first of this year's rabies vaccination clinics on Wednesday, May 12, when Dr. Scarborough will be in Zebulon. The clinics, to be held all over the county, are sponsored by the Wake County Health Department. A charge of \$1.00 is made for each dog vaccinated.

Dr. A. C. Bulla, County Health Officer, calls vaccination of dogs one of the best means of controlling rabies. The clinics, he said, are held to give dog owner an opportunity to comply with the Rabies Control Law requiring dogs to be vaccinated.

Rabies vaccination clinics in this section of the county will be held at Zebulon and Gay's Store on Highway 64 next Wednesday from 5 to 7 p. m.

Next Thursday, May 13, the clinics will be conducted at Hopkins Cross Roads and J. G. Robertson's Store in Rolesville.

On Friday a clinic will be held at C. E. Young's Store at Barham's Siding; and on Wednesday, May 19, at Jones Store at Fowler's Cross Roads.

Other dates include Cary Robertson's Store on Friday, May 21; Eagle Rock Store on July 22; Wendell Town Hall of July 23; and Lake Myra Store on July 23.

The time from all clinics will be 5 to 7 p. m.
