#### Legality Questioned

Thereafter Dr. L. M. Massey, chairman of the Board of Adjustment, raised the question of the legality of the action, since there was no report made to the commissioners by the adjustment group.

Town Attorney Foster Finch stated that it was his opinion that the rezoning action was entirely regular, and he was backed up by George Franklin, attorney with the North Carolina League of Municipalities.

Davis said that by state law the Board of Commissioners cannot make an original zoning decision without prior action by the Zoning Commission, but he pointed out that as soon as the original zoning ordinance is passed, the Zoning Commission no longer exists. Its membership, if continued in office, then became members of a Board of Adjustment.

### **Methodists** Plan **Special Program**


