### **Board Chairman** Says Community **Is Very Fortunate**

"We feel fortunate in having Mr. Jones come to Zebulon," stated Ed Hales, chairman of the Wakelon School Board yesterday as he introduced the new Wakelon principal around the community. The announcement of the school board's action in naming Franklin Ross Jones to be Wakelon principal climaxed an intensive search by the board members for a successor to W. R. Whittenton.

During the period since Mr. Whittenton submitted his resignation to the school board, over a dozen names were considered by the board, and considerable time

Chairman Hales said that peoommendation to Mr. Jones, who has participated in every phase of community activity during his five years as principal of the Henderson Junior High School.

Members of the Wakelon school board reported that, in addition to a school administrator and teacher, they looked for someone who would fit into the community
