

The Rev. Bev. A. Asbury, pastor of the Zebulon Baptist Church, gave the invocation and prayer of dedication.


Price Makes Presentation

Plants Damaged By Nematodes

Dr. Joseph N. Sasser, Nickels for Know-How nematologist at State College, is in the market for nematodes, or rather nematodedamaged plants.

They shouldn' the hard to find, since nematodes dine on about every crop known to North Carolina, but nematode damage is pretty difficult to identify outside the laboratory.

Tobacco is probably the hardest hit by nematodes — the tiny worm-like animals destroy \$30 million worth a year in North Carolina. Right now, tobacco has reached the size where you can begin to see evidence of nematode damage.

Wilts and Yellows

Usually stunted, it wilts and yellows in the afternoon; however, there are other factors that cause the same conditions. If you think nematodes might be damaging your crop, send a sample plant to 36 Sasser, and include roots and information about the specimen and the conditions under which it was grown.


