### Parrish Tells Lions Of New Medical Field

The Zebulon Lions Club heard Gilmer Parrish, proprietor of Parrish Electric Co., talk about abnormality last Thursday night in the Wakelon cafeteria.

Having been a student for some time of psychology, Mr. Parrish talked about a new, distinctive phase of this science, "Psychosomatic Medicine," which he called a new term with an old meaning. Psychosomatic medicine, he said, is a new field of medicine combining the knowledge of both medicine and psychiatry and deals with mind-body relationships.

He pointed out that many ailments, such as overweight and diabetes, that are commonly thought to result from malfunction in the body are actually the outgrowth of emotional disturbances.

### Thin Line of Separation

He added that the line separating the normal from the abnormal disposition was razor-thin and difficult to define, although "66% of the people in doctors' offices are psychosomatic."

Other happenings at the meeting Thursday night included the formal induction of two new members, Jack Harris and Hunter James. Wilbur Debnam presented their pins and welcomed them into the club.

Lions are currently making plans for the Regional Lions Club meeting to be held here April 7.

Garner affirmative lost to Selma negative at Wakelon.

The matches were in progress simultaneously. They debated the query, Resolved that the federal government should initiate a policy of free trade with the nations that are friendly to the United States.

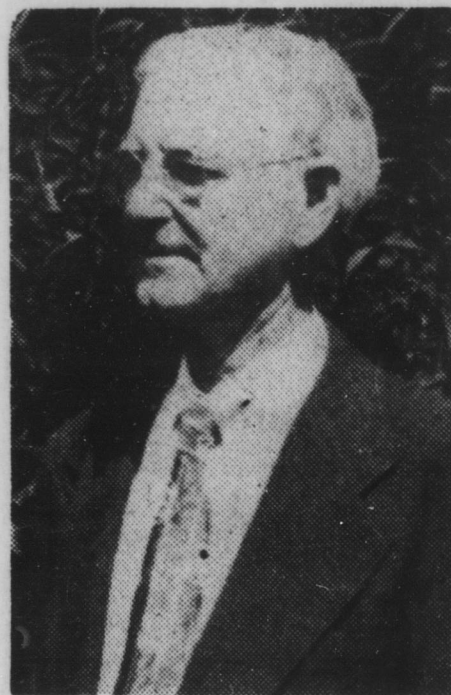
Wakelon affirmative will advance to the district contest. District winners will compete in the finals to be held at Chapel Hill April 28 and 29.

### Pre-School Clinic Set For April 5th and 6th

A pre-school clinic will be conducted at Wakelon School, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 5 and 6.

A doctor from the County Health Department will be here from 1:00 p. m. until 3:00 p. m. Tuesday, and Mr. Jones requests that Zebulon children who will enter the first grade next year be present in the school gymnasium at that time.

Mr. Jones asks out of town children to come Wednesday between the times of 9:00 a. m. and 3:00 p. m.

Complete immunizations are required of all children, said Mr. Jones, adding that arrangements to entertain the children and facilitate enrollment of an expected 100 are being completed.

## Must Be Assured Of 15,000 Bushels For Potato Storage

The following statement has been issued by the Farm Bureau sweet potato committee, headed by Dewey Massey, urging farmers' cooperation in the promotion of a sweet potato project:

"Up until the present time it seems that general opinion endorses our Farm Bureau promotion of a sweet potato project in Zebulon, but if active interest is any gauge of progress the project is faltering.

"We have talked to many farmers and they all agree that the idea is good; as yet however there have been no guarantees as to their measure of participation.

"Now, guarantee is precisely the essential element at this stage of the project.

"Foster Finch, who has agreed to provide storage and curing facilities and to help us generally insofar as his means permit at this time, can not sacrifice time and effort if he is not guaranteed 15,000 bushels for storage at \$.50 a bushel, which is cheap as you can find out from anyone well informed about sweet potatoes.

"Benefits likely to come from promotion of the project are several. We can expect to have more land lying fallow this year as a result of reduced tobacco allotments, and we feel this is an unusually good opportunity to make use of that land and benefit ourselves by doing so.

"It will be good for us; it will be good for the town. We can expect more money in circulation in Zebulon. Slight increases in buying and selling mean more in a town of this size than elsewhere.

"It is the contemplated opinion of this committee that Zebulon needs a program of this kind. We (See POTATOES, Page 4)

## Couples Class to Hear Gilbert Beck

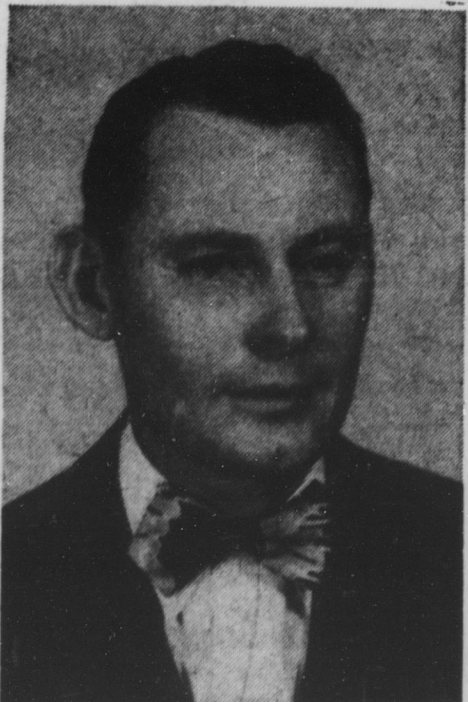
