Rotary Club Sees Anniversary Film Last Friday Night

A meeting of the local Finer Carolina Committee has been scheduled for tonight at 7:45 in Town Hall.

Committee Chairman Thurman Murray, who announced the meeting Wednesday, urged that all sub-committees be represented, hoping that progress can be accelerated on projects selected for this year's contest.

Harold Taylor, chairman of the sub-committee in charge of constructing a Negro Community Center on Highway 64 close to Shepard School, reported this week that final preparations have been made for erection of the Center.

Members of this sub-committee met Wednesday night, March 16, and recommended a one story

building, consisting of five rooms and an auditorium, for construction.

Kerr Scott's World Food Bank Plan Explained by Press Secretary

TRADE. The old question of what to do about foreign trade is one of the toughest and most controversial issues facing this session of Congress.

A general tightening of the domestic economy has thrown considerable support behind the high-tariff school of thought. The so-called "protectionists" argue that high tariffs are needed to keep cheap, foreign-produced products off the American market at a time when competition is keen among domestic producers.

STOCKS. The argument over trade policy is taking place under unique circumstances. Sentiment for high tariffs is increasing at a time when surpluses are piling up in all agricultural products—at a time when increased exports are sorely needed to reduce the backlog of commodities now stored in warehouses.

NEW APPROACH. In an effort

to help break the logjam now choking world trade, Senator W. Kerr Scott has proposed what he calls a plan for a "World Food Bank."

Under his plan, free countries of the world would set up a food bank along the lines of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development.

Under Senator Scott's plan, countries with abundance of food, fiber and other agricultural products would loan needy countries, through the world food bank, food and other raw material to fight hunger and famine.

'55 Rabies Control Program To Begin in Zebulon Today

The rabies control program will begin April 1 at the City Hall in Zebulon, A. C. Bulla, Wake County Health officer announced March 30.

These clinics will continue from April 1 through May and will be held from 5 to 7 p. m. in the afternoon at places throughout the county most convenient to the largest number of people who may have dogs to be vaccinated.

We have been very fortunate for 10 years or more not to have a report of a rabid dog in Wake Coun-

ty Mr. Bulla said; however, adjoining counties to the east and south of us have had their problems in the last year with rabid dogs, but fortunately for us and for dog owners—we contribute our success to dog owners to a large extent — these dogs have been kept out of Wake County so far.

Rabies in animals, especially dogs, can only be controlled by cooperation of dog owners, who as a rule will see to it that their dogs, if considered valuable, have been listed for taxation and have been or will be at the proper time vaccinated against rabies Dr. Bulla said, adding:

This leaves the stray dogs and unwanted dogs and owners who consider them not valuable enough to list them for taxes or to have them vaccinated to be controlled by the Rabies Control Officer.

This can best be done by such dog owners reporting them to the Rabies Control Officer, have them picked up and carried to the local impounding facility. This procedure will take care of the stray and unwanted dogs. All others should be vaccinated.

Pre-School Clinic Set April 5-6 at Wakelon

A Pre-School Clinic will be held at Wakelon School, April 5 and 6 for children entering the first grade next year.

Wakelon Principal Franklin Jones has announced that a doctor will be here from 1:00 p. m. to 3:00 p. m. on April 5 and from 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. on April 6.

Mr. Jones requested that only Zebulon children be brought April 5, reserving April 6 for children in rural districts.

Clinic will be held in Wakelon Gym, and Mr. Jones asked that each child have with him his birth certificate.

He said that parents unable to bring their children on the requested date contact the school so that special arrangements can be made.

Immunization is required of all children before they enter school.

Easter Cantata

The Sanctuary Choir of the Zebulon Baptist Church will present "Cantata for Eastertide" this Sunday evening at seven-thirty.

"Adoremus Te" by Joseph Clokey, which the choir sang last year, will be presented again this year. The theme of the cantata is "We Adore Thee," and proclaims the adoration of Christ by all nature.

Sweet Potato Committee Asks Farmers for Data

Local sweet potato committeemen stepped up preparations in Town Hall last Saturday night for organized potato growth in the Zebulon area, arranging to have publicity material sent to all Farm Bureau members.

Letters will be sent to each member explaining basic facts about the project from its inception until the present time.

Committee ruled to include post-cards with the letters, printed with specific questions conceived with a view to determining the degree farmers can be expected to participate in the project.

These cards will be return-ad-

dressed to Farm Bureau publicity chairman Hunter James. Farmers will be urged to answer the questions and return cards promptly if interested in the project.

This will enable officials to complete final marketing plans.

Final plans cannot be completed as yet, they said, because acreage is at this time the determining factor.

Whether farmers will market the potatoes in a joint effort depends on the number of bushels that will be grown. Organized marketing, according to the committee, will not be feasible without at least
