Boy Scouts to Go To Firing Range With Guardsmen

Troop 340 will be permitted to participate in the two all-day periods of marksmanship training planned for the National Guardsmen of Battery A, Lt. Jack Potter announced this week. Over a half dozen of the Scouts are working for the Marksmanship Merit Badge, and other members of the troop are invited to join in the training.

Battery A will hold all-day drills on Sunday, May 29, and Sunday. June 5, to train with the M-1 rifle in preparation for the weekend firing at Ft. Bragg on June 11-12.

Lt. Potter, who has been in charge of the small arms training in Battery A for four years, worked with six of the Scouts on Monday of this week in the Davis Armory rifle range. Firing was conducted with the Guard's precision .22 caliber rifles which are used in National Rifle Association competition.


