

The principal address at the first annual Zebulon Memorial Day service will be given by Cale K. Burgess, Raleigh attorney, and one of the founders of the American Legion in 1918. This service will be held Sunday, May 29, in Zebulon Cemetery under the auspices of the local American Legion Auxiliary.

National Guard members here will provide honor and color guards for the service. Practically every man on the program is a veteran and some are still in active

Honored recognition will also go to the boy scouts, girl scouts, cubs and brownies standing in a body for the service. The boy scouts will be in charge of displaying flags not only in the cemetery for the service but also on the streets of the town two days prior to the
